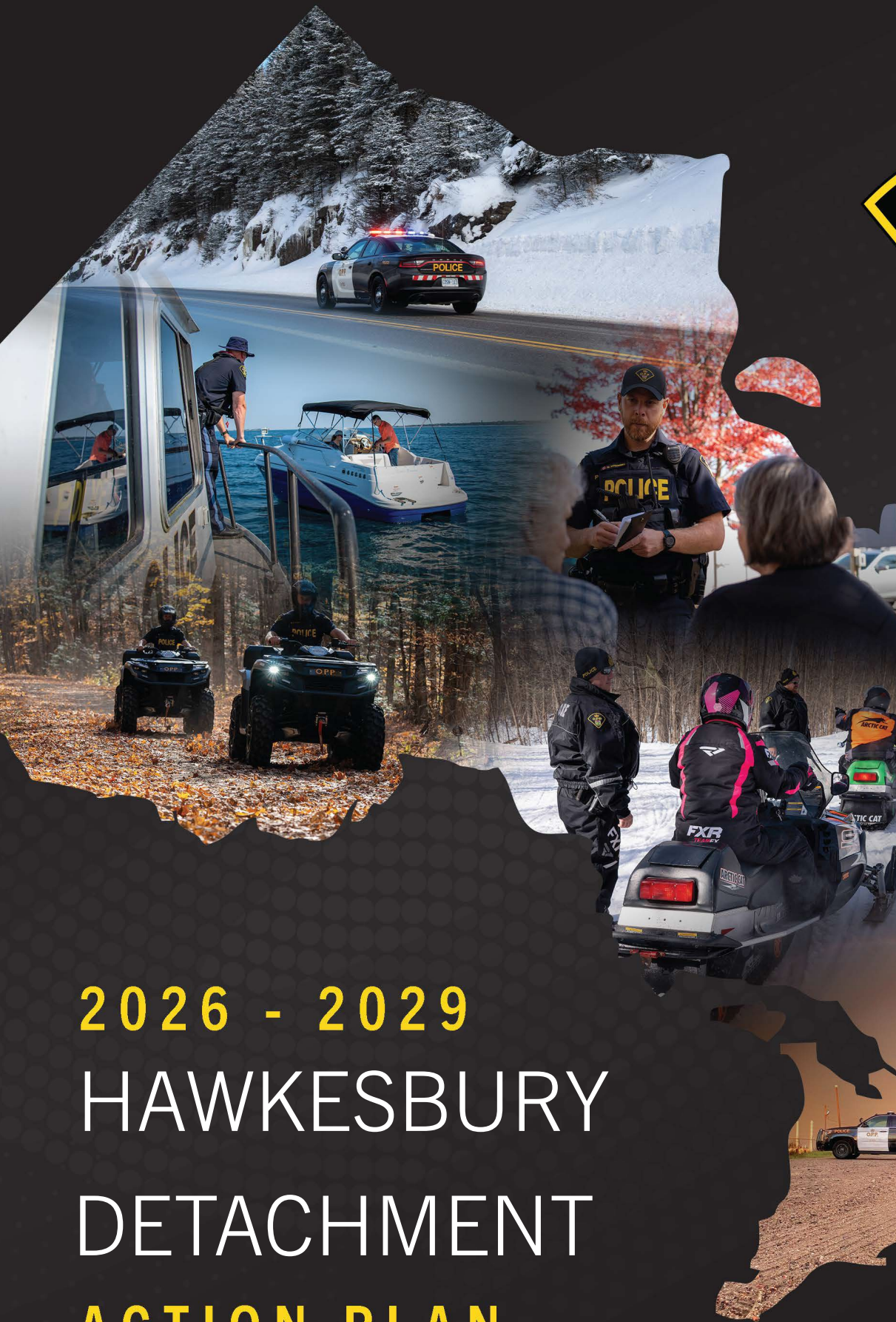

I am pleased to present the 2026-2029 Hawkesbury Detachment Action Plan. This action plan has been prepared and adopted per the *Community Safety and Policing Act, 2019* (CSPA) and in alignment with the Ontario Provincial Police 2026-2029 Strategic Plan.



The 2026-2029 Hawkesbury Detachment Action Plan outlines commitments, actions, and desired outcomes for the detachment over the next four years. It addresses how we will provide adequate and effective policing in our area and will meet the needs of the communities we serve. To reflect these priorities, the plan is organized in three sections:

- Crime
- Roadways, Waterways and Trails
- Community Well-Being

The plan also includes qualitative and quantitative performance objectives and indicators so we can appropriately measure the outcomes of our actions.

The 2026-2029 Hawkesbury Detachment Action Plan was created in consultation with relevant stakeholders. We met with our OPP Detachment Boards, which includes local community members, and incorporated the objectives and priorities they determined for the detachment. We put a survey out and received input from various groups representing a diverse group of stakeholders and community partners including school boards, hospital and victim services.

The 2026-2029 Hawkesbury Detachment Action Plan is the first action plan prepared under the CSPA. Detachment Board Annual Reports will continue to be enhanced to reflect the updated reporting requirements.

I am proud of the work we do and the relationships we have built at the Hawkesbury Detachment, and I look forward to our growth and achievements in implementing then 2026-2029 Hawkesbury Detachment Action Plan.

Our Detachment

Hawkesbury is a growing town located along one of the oldest trade routes in North America. The local and regional economy have experienced significant hardships over the last 30 years. Hawkesbury witnessed the closure of several large companies including Canadian International Paper (CIP) in 1983, and Amoco in the early 2000s. These closures were a setback not only to the local economy but also to the town's collective identity. As a result, a greater economic diversification in the businesses operating in the industrial and services sector can be noted today. It has retained the strong sense of community that makes Hawkesbury a great place to live, work and raise a family.

The Town of Hawkesbury has a population of just over 10,700. The newly constructed, modern detachment enables us to effectively house and deploy police resources, including our marine unit from our local dock. A community partnership has been embedded in our detachment, providing a safe space for social service agencies to provide their services in the local setting and paving the way for stronger relationships. The skills and training of our local officers, in conjunction with community resources and the greater OPP, allow us to enhance the safety and security for all those we serve.

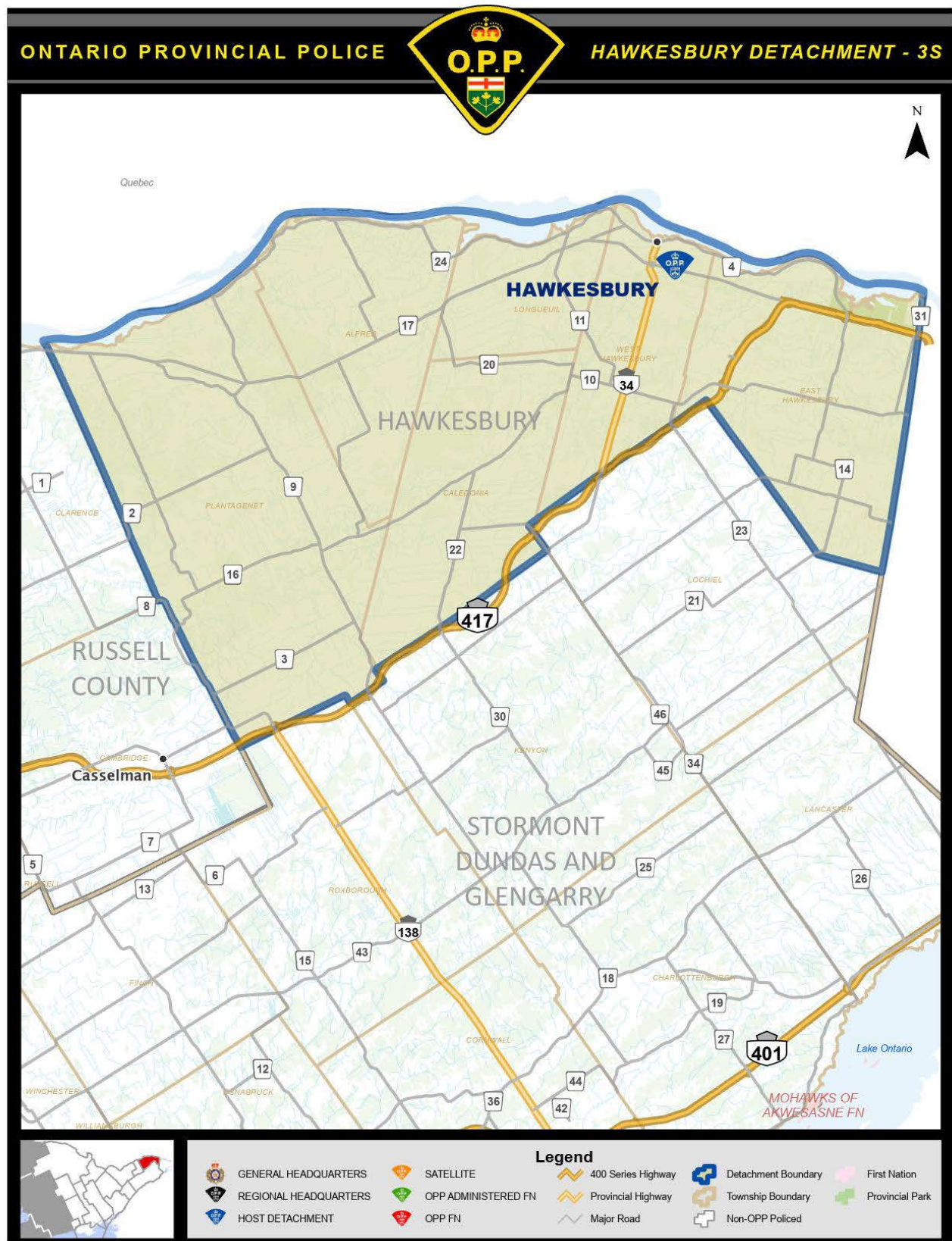
The Hawkesbury Detachment is situated in eastern Ontario, bordered by the Province of Québec on the north and east sides. We police the following five municipalities within Prescott-Russell County: Township of Alfred-Plantagenet, Champlain Township, Township of East Hawkesbury, part of the Nation Township and the Town of Hawkesbury.

The United Counties of Prescott-Russell are also home to Voyageur Provincial Park, which is located on the Ottawa River and is a tourist destination during the summer months. There are 1,291 kilometres of municipal and county roads, as well as many kilometres of provincial highways, including Highways 417, 17 and 34. Between Montreal and Ottawa, Hawkesbury is home to the only bridge linking Ontario and Québec. This connection to the Laurentides Region makes Hawkesbury a social and service hub for many communities in Québec. The majority of residents in Prescott County are Francophone. Hawkesbury boasts a variety of services, community programs and a progressive economic development strategy. There are recreational activities including boating, fishing, trail systems for walking and biking, community recreation programs, greenspaces and waterfront parks. The Hawkesbury General Hospital (HGH) provides high quality health care to residents of Prescott-Russell and surrounding areas. HGH is a patient-centered bilingual community hospital that has been renovated to become a full-service hospital. The hospital has outpatient services available in Casselman and Clarence Rockland. HGH and the Hawkesbury Detachment continue to collaborate together in order to increase the overall health and well-being of the community.

Our detachment is comprised of a professional team, focused on delivering quality policing services to the community of Hawkesbury and the United Counties of Prescott-Russell. We strive to build strong relationships and partnerships, working collectively to provide effective and efficient service. Our officers patrol our roadways and waterways and conduct foot and bicycle patrols within our community.

Action Plan Commitments Summary

The OPP's action planning process is guided by Section 70 (1) of the *Community Safety and Policing Act, 2019* and ensures compliance with the *Adequate and Effective Policing (General)* standards filed as O. Reg. 392/23.

Through analysis and consultation, the following objectives and priorities were identified for the next four years. These are reflective of how adequate and effective policing will be provided in the area served by the detachment, in accordance with the needs and diversity of the population.

- Crime:
 - Community-based crime prevention initiatives.
 - Property crime and clearance rates for property crime; Increase surveillance and enforcement against theft, break-ins, auto theft and human trafficking.
 - Combat drug trafficking through targeted operations and community education.
 - Expand fraud prevention programs, especially for seniors and newcomers.
 - Youth engagement and education; partner with schools to teach about crime consequences, drug risks, and digital safety.
 - Repeat offenders and bail compliance enforcement.
- Roadways, Waterways and Trails:
 - Road safety; Target speeding, distracted driving, and aggressive behavior on key roads.
 - Promote courteous road sharing among drivers, cyclists, and pedestrians.
 - Educate youth on safe driving and social media use through school programs.
 - Marine Patrols on our waterways and continue the visibility on our waterways along with Sûreté du Québec.
 - Increase police and patrol presence on snowmobile trails during winter months.
 - Enhance safety and community connection by ensuring visibility in recreational areas.
 - Presence on trails helps deter unsafe behavior and fosters a sense of security for users.
- Community Well-Being:
 - Assistance to victims of crime and re-victimization rate; continue the strong engagement that we have with our mobile crisis response team, victim services and victim witness assistance program.
 - Work with municipal officials, by-law officers, fire departments, and community paramedics in more community engagement and activities.
 - Collaborate more with parole officers and social services (unhoused initiatives).
 - Support youth organizations like cadets, minor hockey, and wellness hubs.
 - Participate in sports and recreational activities to foster positive relationships with our youths.
 - Community partnerships for initiatives and programming related to gender-based violence, mental health, addictions, and hate crimes.

Know your location - be ready to describe the situation and your location. Look for addresses, landmarks and buildings that may help identify your location.

REACH THE OPP BY PHONE

- Call 9-1-1 if there is an immediate risk to someone's life or property
 - to stop or report a crime in progress
 - to report a fire
 - to report a life-threatening medical emergency
 - Don't hang up, stay on the line
- To report non-life-threatening incidents that require a police response, use the non-emergency line (1-888-310-1122) or go to opp.ca/reporting
- TTY 1-888-310-1133 or agent 511 for registered subscribers may be used for individuals in the Deaf, Hard of Hearing and Speech Impaired (DHHSI) community to contact police
- For all administrative inquiries or to schedule an appointment, find contact information for your local detachment at opp.ca/detachments

REPORT AN INCIDENT ONLINE

- The OPP offers online reporting for minor, non-emergency occurrences in areas of OPP jurisdiction. opp.ca/reporting allows you to submit a report without visiting or calling.
- Use the online reporting tool for:
 - Theft Under \$5,000
 - Mischief / Damage to Property Under \$5,000
 - Mischief / Damage to Vehicle Under \$5,000
 - Theft from Vehicle Under \$5,000
 - Lost / Missing Property Under \$5,000, including a licence plate(s) or validation sticker(s)
 - Driving Complaints

If you are reporting an emergency, call 9-1-1.

9-1-1 is for emergencies only:
If there is an immediate risk to someone's life or property.

- ✓ a crime in progress
- ✓ a fire
- ✓ a life-threatening medical emergency

Dialed 9-1-1 accidentally? #Be911Ready. Don't hang up, stay on the line and speak with an OPP Communicator to confirm there's no emergency.

The misuse of 911 ties up emergency lines, communicators and officers, which can result in a slower response to a real emergency and risks the safety of people who may need urgent help.

It is against the law to call 9-1-1 as a joke. Prank 9-1-1 calls can be dangerous and waste valuable emergency resources.
